Commitment

We want our young people to grow up with a strong work ethic and sense of commitment towards all that they do. This makes for excellent citizens. I will elaborate on two key examples.

Attendance at School: One of the biggest barriers to student learning is absence from school and classes. While most of our students are good attenders, some are not and seem to have time off school for the most spurious of reasons. My comments here are aimed at parents who are not too worried if their child is off school for reasons which most of us would not see as justifiable and are not intended to upset others. It is important to remember that we often have to do things that we don't enjoy in life and we need to learn to tough it out.

Students should only be absent from school if they are too sick to get out of bed or are injured or incapacitated in some way which prevents them getting here or they must attend some occasion where their attendance is vital and where it cannot occur at another time (eg funeral). All absences should be explained by a written note which is brought in to the Tutor Teacher. A phone call may suffice where a staff member knows you well enough to identify your voice or an e-mail from a work address. Students have been falsely explaining their own unjustified absences for generations so we do take care to verify the author of the message.

Many parents choose to take family holidays outside school holiday times because it is cheaper but there can be a cost to the students off school who miss vital classes and even assessments. Our standard letter states that we do not condone this but we cannot prevent it. Some parents keep students at home as baby-sitters for younger siblings. In my view, this is totally unacceptable. The future of the elder child is being put at risk. Too many parents provide some explanation for an unacceptable absence as we demand notes and the line of least resistance is taken. Young people who get away with taking unjustified time off school will expect to be able to do the same in the workforce later. They will have a poor work ethic and attendance record in employment and will struggle to keep a job. Much of what we do in schools is sound preparation for life. If you are complicit in a teenager's poor attendance, you are likely to be complicit in their failure in life.

Loyalty to a Team: With the busiest time of the sporting year about to get underway, it is important that all students who have signed up to play a sport and been placed in a team, attend every practice and every game throughout the season. A team cannot function if several players do not turn up. If a player is too ill or injured to play, they must let the coach or manager know well in advance. If an injured player can physically attend practices and games, then they should and help on the side-line in whatever way possible. Being part of a sports team teaches much more than the skills of the game. It also teaches the meaning of the word commitment, relating to others, participating and contributing and good communication.

Fees / Costs / Tough Times Etc

I know that having a busy teenager at secondary school is an expensive business. Uniforms, stationery, subject fees, sports fees and so on. I reiterate to you that having a busy engaged teenager is to have a successful happy one but we are also prepared to be as flexible as possible with you on meeting the costs. While I would love all our youngsters to be playing a sport, you can take the rest of the year to pay for it. We simply ask that you speak to our accounts staff to make an arrangement that suits your needs. The college cannot afford to carry the cost itself (except perhaps in the most extreme cases of hardship) but we can give you longer to pay. As long as we know that the money is coming in, we can cover costs in the short term.
