All students enjoyed meeting Mr McKinley and appreciated his speech in which he conveyed how important that International students are to the culture and diversity at our school. # **Gateway Final Evening**

This year saw another successful Gateway Year. We received funding for 50 Gateway students this year. Fifty five students were placed in various job roles on the North Shore. Overall students felt Gateway provided a great experience and they appreciated the opportunity to explore their jobs of interest. Students have achieved an average of just over 21 credits, (TEC requires are average of 20 credits). Credits include level 1, 2 and 3.

# **Senior French Trip**

The Senior French Class, along with their teacher Mrs Drabble, celebrated the end of five years of French learning at Le Rendez-Vous Café next to the Pumphouse Theatre in Takapuna. Savoury and sweet crêpes were the favoured choice of all, accompanied by some delicious iced chocolates, milkshakes and juices. The experience was in an authentically French environment.

The Manager was so impressed by the pride and respect that our students showed throughout our visit that she drew Mrs Drabble to one side at the end and offered a weekend job to our students, if they would like one.

#### E-Learn

Senior students are sometimes able to take an E-Learn course as one of their courses if there is a clash with their timetable or is subject is not available at school. We have had students from Level 2 and 3 in the past, and they participated in a variety of areas such as Economics, Art History, Classics, and Chinese. Only students who are self-motivated and determined to succeed are offered this learning option. Students have an "E-Teacher" from a school somewhere in New Zealand who sends them weekly work to do on an online platform, such as Google Classroom. The E-Class meets once a week for a Video Conference where you see your E-Teacher and other members of your E-Class to check your work, ask questions, and have a more "traditional" type of esson.
