
#### **VEX Robotics Programme**

Glenfield College runs an active VEX Robotics programme. The VEX competition uses an integrated learning approach to allow the students to solve the various, mechanical, electrical, and programming problems that arise as they seek to build the best robot in the world for the current competition.



We currently have six teams competing in the senior secondary school section. The teams are preparing themselves for their next big competition which is **3-7 December**. This is the Asia Pacific Robotics Competition (APAC) held in the Rotorua Events Centre.

The APAC competition in December will see more than 300 teams from 10 different countries competing in several different categories. We compete in the High School VEX EDR competition, which this year is called "In the zone." The robots collect and stack yellow cones onto red and blue mobile goals. It is lots of fun and quite challenging. Most teams have built and rebuilt their robots several times already.



APAC is the second biggest Robotics competition in world. The VEX World Championships, held in Kentucky, USA, are the biggest, with 1000 teams competing. Glenfield College has qualified at the NZ VEX Nationals and attended the VEX World Championships five times. In this time, we have received VEX Divisional World Awards for robot building and community involvement. We were awarded the VEX World Excellence award in 2015. This is the top team award. The school was awarded the VEX World Educate award in 2013 for integrating Robotics into education. In 2016 Mr Aston was awarded the VEX teacher of the year award and inducted into the VEX hall of fame.
