Message from departing Deputy Principal, Mrs Anne Kabalin

When I set off on my teaching journey halfway across the world in Johannesburg, I did not ever think I would be writing the final newsletter of the year for a school. It is truly an honour to be signing off from my teaching career in this manner.

Glenfield College has been my home from home for the last 21 years. I have so enjoyed the time I have spent here, working with outstanding colleagues and the most honest, real and down-to-earth teenagers

on the North Shore. I remember my first day and the welcome I received from the staff as clearly as if it were yesterday, and I especially thank the members of the Social Science Department, led by Tony McCracken for the welcome and for the support they gave me.

I have been extremely lucky throughout my career to work in schools led by outstanding principals. Warren Seastrand, Ted Benton, CJ Healey and Paul McKinley are leaders who worked tirelessly to better the school and each have left their mark on Glenfield College.

I am privileged to have worked with some truly amazing colleagues. The various Boards of Trustees who have governed the school during the last 21 years have all contributed to what we know and love as Glenfield College. I especially commend the present Board for their vision which has led to many improvements around the school and I wish them well for those which are planned for the future.



As part of the challenge the students had to carry all their food and tents as they went, meaning they all had full packs strapped to their back as they went. While on the trip students investigated the land use of the area and made notes on their teamwork and comradeship. The students who completed the Silver Award walked for 3 days and camped for 2 nights. The Gold Award students completed 4 full days of tramping and 3 nights camping.


