Spirit of Adventure Excursion







In early June I was given the opportunity to go on board the Spirit of New Zealand for a 10-day voyage. I was fortunate enough to receive a scholarship that allowed me to go. Before I went onboard I had two things that I wanted to achieve while I was away. I wanted to climb to the top of the mast. One of the first activities onboard was to climb to the top of the mast which meant I was able to achieve it. I climbed multiple times after that but not always to the top. One time we were sailing through a narrow passage at Great Barrier Island while a group of us were up there (the view was AMAZING!!). The other thing that I wanted to do was to see marine life. Over the ten days, we saw dolphins (three times), whales, penguins and stingrays. Our voyage took us to Waiheke Island, Coromandel, Great Barrier Island and Kawau before coming back to Auckland Harbour. There were other fun activities that we did throughout the voyage. These included sailing, afternoon swims (with the rope swing occasionally), lots of climbing (up the rigging as well as out onto the bowsprit), beach games ashore, sailing in the luggers, roasting marshmallows over a bonfire and going for a day tramp on Great Barrier. Other highlights for me were steering the ship, doing night watch, and hanging out with everyone as well as making new friends. I would recommend this trip to you all as it is a trip of a lifetime.

Ten fun-filled days on board the Spirit of New Zealand

Each day began at precisely 6.30am when we all jumped off the side of the ship into the ocean. What a way to wake up! Once we had rinsed off, we'd prepare for the day and have breakfast. After breakfast, we'd have what was known as "colours," a gathering of everyone on the aft deck at the stern of the ship. This is when we would be told what the plan for the day was. After colours, we would then move on to the roles that each watch had that we rotated through over the ten days. The first one for my watch, Port B, was "Specials," helping serve food and dishes for each meal. The second was food prep in the morning. The third one was night watch and cleaning the deck. The night watch was really interesting. In pairs, we would be in the wheelhouse monitoring screens that measured things like wind speed and direction, water depth, and anchor points. We had shifts of two hours all through the night. The final role we rotated through was cleaning the accommodation area in the morning. Once we finished, we moved on to the activities for the day. Over the ten days, we did activities like climbing to the top of the mast (28.7 m high), rafting in inflatable boats, a beach clean-up on Kawau Island, sailing both the ship and smaller lugger boats, and a day hike around Kaikoura Island. On night seven, we had dinner around a campfire ashore at Smokehouse Bay, Great Barrier Island. On the afternoon of day eight, we saw a whole pod of dolphins! It was so incredible to see them in the wild! We learned so much about being on a ship, like how to set the sails correctly so we went in the right direction, how to stow the sails away when they aren't required, and map skills. I certainly learned a lot about what I am capable of and how to lead in unfamiliar situations. I made a reliable group of friends throughout the trip that I still maintain contact with since I returned. Even so, soon afterwards, I treasure the memories and experiences of the voyage and all that had happened.








Senior Drama Performance

From July 24 until 2 August, we have 19 Japanese students arrive to be a part of the Glenfield College whanau. This is a very short stay intended to give them a taste of NZ schools and family life. It would be wonderful to have as many of these students hosted with our Glenfield students. Students are aged 13 -15 and are able to be placed either single or as a pair. Host families will receive \$320 per week for hosting a student.

Your child will be issued a Glenfield College parking pass so that if they park on our top driveway we are aware of their car and can find them if need be. Please note that the top driveway is a shared space with Glenfield Rugby Club, and the Wilson and Wairau students also use this driveway. The privilege of driving to school comes with an expectation that your child will drive responsibly and will not carry illegal passengers. Digital permission to bring a vehicle to school is linked <u>here</u>. it is mandatory your child has a parking pass if they are going to be driving to school this term.


